

3. Muskoka United Football Club (MUFC)



- First year as a separate club, with status granted by the governing bodies.
- Run by a board of 8: 4 from HSC and 4 from BSC. The 4 from HSC are Honor, Steph, Glen and me.
- This past year we had over 100 players and 6 teams above the u13 age group: 3 girls / 3 boys.
- We had 3 teams compete in the I-Model: u17G, u15B and u13G.
- We had 2 teams win their HDSL divisions: u17B and u15G and the u13B played up a year and did well.
- This upcoming year, we hope to have 8 rep teams in the same age groups: 4 girls / 4 boys teams.
- MUFC is also taking over the development program for HSC and BSC and we hope to have an additional 8 teams.
- To increase the competitiveness of the teams and to increase skill and overall athletic ability, MUFC has expanded their program (compared to that HSC was able to offer) to include indoor training and specific coach training
















3. Muskoka United Football Club

4. Minor Soccer Report

HUNTSVILLE SOCCER CLUB

- Number of Winter (Indoor) Youth House League players = <u>54</u>
 - 43 Boys, 11 Girls
- Number of Summer Youth House League players = <u>580</u>
 - U4 = 78
 - U6 girls = 51; U6 boys = 77
 - U8 girls = 43; U8 boys = 92
 - U10 girls = 47; U10 boys = 76
 - U12 girls = 44; U12 boys = 48
 - U15 co-ed = 24
- Number of Fall League players = 100

- Two Program Coordinators were hired to run the house league programs

6. Adult Coordinator Report (cont'd)



Indoor

Tuesday Experienced/Competitive League- 6-10pm HHS Gym C. 45 min time slots for games. 8 teams of 6-7 players. Some difficulty with consistent turnout and varying skill.

Thursday Intermediate Pick up- 8-10PM HHS GYM C. No intermediate interest, so it became an overflow of competitive players wanting more playing time, often combining players with Exec Volunteer in Gym AB.

Outdoor

Intermediate - 7v7 format reflected registration interest. Consistent turnout each week. Made two teams that played each other all summer (offered Pick-up but majority chose two teams). Finished 10 week season with pizza and positive feedback. All games were officiated.

Experienced - 4 Teams of 18 filled quickly. Waitlist was used due to injuries. New this year was an Introduction night of pick up games where players could meet/re-unite and coordinators could assess skill to assist in team organizing prior to season start. Successful season with playoffs, pizza & prizes. Referee/Assistant Referee (2).

6. Adult Coordinator Report (cont'd)



*Field Conditions were awful. Poor conditions were responsible for unnecessary play errors and increased risk of injury to players. Town of Huntsville neglected to raise standards of maintenance to provide sufficient grass. Many complaints received.

Sunday Only - numbers dropped significantly in July and August. Pick up games moved to 9am in summer months (hot), back to 10am in Spring and Fall. Sundays were offered as a complimentary add-on to league registrations. Not officiated.

Men's League - Great addition, growing interest. Pick-up style and flexible format (7v7, 9v9, etc.) reflected the weekly attendance... Games had a Referee from May - August. Night needs to be scheduled a few days apart from Thursday league play.

Carlos Tournament - 7v7, Conroy Park, 2 fields, 60 players, 6 teams of 10. Pizza, prizes, music.

7. Women's Coordinator Report



2023 marked the inaugural season of the Huntsville Women Only Soccer League.

The Women's League was made up of four teams of 12 players each, 48 registered players in total, competing weekly in a 7v7 format.

Rules and field dimensions were modified to accommodate this format.

The season was played over ten weeks with each team competing in eleven games and can be considered to be a very successful first year.



7. Women's Coordinator Report (cont'd)





- Through the help of HSC, we secured 4 team sponsors as well as 3 others to help offset the cost of uniforms, prizes and the year-end champions trophy.
- Suggestions for improvement include finding field space to move off the turf field to grass, lessening the risk of injury.
- Huntsville FC est. 2016, made up of advanced adult female players, continued their successful run. Weekly training throughout the winter and summer months proves highly beneficial to the overall improvement of skill level and team comradery.
- The Women's Coordinator has been a new position to HSC and our female members have been encouraged to voice their opinions through me, for action by HSC.

8. Head Referee Report

In 2023, the Huntsville Soccer Club had a total of 14 Match Officials who were either returning from last season or newly signed up through the online Ontario Soccer Association Referee Course.



Our soccer season ran from April 29th to September 28th, 2023 with a total of 215 games including the popular House League Soccer Day, the Carlos Burmeister Invitational tournament and HDSA U8 Festival.

In addition to this total, are 60 competitive games for Muskoka United Football Club, a new collaboration between Huntsville and Bracebridge.

8. Head Referee Report (cont'd)





We were extremely successful in filling our match official assignments for 2023

(Ref and A/R's, a rate of 98.3%)

9. Treasurer Report

The Club is reporting a net income of \$12,700, compared to break-even last year. Interest contributed to \$6,000 due to higher GIC interest rates.

- Revenue has returned to \$175K in line with 2015/2016 up \$25K from last year,
 - Rep extra teams increased revenue, however Rep made a loss due to purchase of new balls and extra uniforms ordered for unregistered players,
 - House League
 - Fall program this continued another revenue stream from Youth with great success,
 - Summer program registrations for youth higher than 2022, and expansion in adult programs for Women's League and Men's League increased revenue and net income for the Adult program.
 - Indoor revenue increased due to expansion of extra Adult teams in the league format
- Net Income was increased due to more control of costs, and accounting for overheads when setting fees for new programs. For existing programs, mainly Youth, there was again no increase in fees since 2018 even though constant pressure from third party fees / costs.
- Donations
 - Carlos Burmeister Memorial \$2,040 in September 2023
 - Huntsville Hospital Foundation \$453 Soccer Day BBQ
- The Club continues to remain in a strong financial position with Net Assets at \$267K.
 - House League is the 'bread and butter' for the Club, and even more important for the Club to take responsibility that Youth numbers continue to grow and become a feeder to MUFC for the Rep teams,
 - The Club will be looking to spend \$25K to \$35K next year on a new set of 4 goals and seating equipment for the south field next year.
